
## TURTLE ISLAND TALES

How might you change your voice while telling it out loud? How might you use your body if you had to tell it silently? Close your eyes and see the story in your imagination. Use your voice, body, and imagination together to TELL, not read, your story. Practice telling it to yourself, a mirror, your mom, your friend, and your stuffed animals. Practice, Practice, PRACTICE. When you think you have it the way you want it, ask your teacher if you could tell your story to the class.
